The end of all our exploring
Will be to arrive where we started
And know the place for the first time.

I am a Phoenician — born and raised in the heart of Phoenix. My earliest memories are tied to a modest home at 8 East Medlock Drive and the close-knit community of St. Francis Xavier Parish. Before the towering structure of what we came to call the BNC — the Big New Church — was even imagined, we worshiped in simpler spaces and learned in humbler classrooms.

I attended St. Francis Xavier School from Kindergarten through the fourth grade. Back then, there was no Uptown Plaza, only a wide, dusty vacant lot where imagination could run wild. The school itself was a scattering of single-story buildings, each filled with the voices of children and the steady presence of the BVM sisters who taught us. They were the heart of the school—women of deep faith and gentle strength. A few lay teachers joined the sisters, I still remember Mrs. Donnelly in second grade and Mrs. Durocher in fourth. The Jesuits mostly appeared on special occasions—celebrating the Mass of the Holy Spirit or blessing our Eighth Grade Graduation.

After many years away, I found myself returning to the parish and school that helped shape me.

And what I found was both familiar and transformed.

Gone are the modest buildings of my childhood. In their place stands a vibrant and growing campus—now with a preschool and a curriculum rich with new ideas and experiences. The sisters may no longer walk the halls, but in their place is a faculty deeply committed to the same Ignatian values: faith, service, reflection, and academic excellence.

Each morning begins with Pledge and Prayer. The fourth grade, led by Mrs. O'Malley, explores the depth and power of kindness. The seventh and eighth graders take on the Arrupe Project, learning what it means to be "kids for others." Weekly liturgies, shared reflections, and a spirit of service continue to weave through every grade.

I look around and see a school that is not only growing but flourishing—evolving with the times while staying true to its roots. St. John Henry Newman once said, "To change is to grow. And to have changed often is to grow holy." It's a reminder that transformation, when rooted in love and purpose, is a sacred gift.

And so, to the parents and grandparents who entrust their children to St. Francis Xavier School: what a gift you're giving. For all that has been — THANKYOU! And for all that is yet to come — YES!

Accreditation is a rigorous process that ensures our Catholic school meets high standards of excellence in academics, faith formation, and organizational integrity. Through self-study, reflection, and external review, accreditation affirms that we are providing students with a quality education rooted in Gospel values. It also encourages continuous improvement, helping us grow as a community of faith and learning. At St. Francis Xavier, accreditation is not just a requirement — it's a commitment to excellence in all we do.

The **WCEA** accreditation process starts 12–18 months ahead, involving leadership teams, data collection, and a self-study focused on Catholic identity, academic effectiveness, and schoolwide improvement. Teachers analyzed benchmark standards and gathered evidence — student work, photos, surveys, and meeting notes — for each standard. This documentation was compiled and shared with the visiting team before their 3-day campus visit.

During the visit, the team immersed themselves in SFX life—attending Mass, visiting classrooms, and speaking with students, parents, staff, and our pastor.

On the final day of the visit, the team spent time celebrating the hard work and spirit of SFX. In a special presentation to our staff, they highlighted the many strengths of our school community and affirmed that we are truly living our mission each day. Their words were a powerful reminder of the vibrant faith, dedication, and care that define St. Francis Xavier. The team also provided us with thoughtful goals to guide our continued growth, encouraging us to remain open to new possibilities while staying rooted in our identity as men, women, and kids for others.




A Brick Border will be installed this summer,

IN MEMORIAM



Few lay women have spent more time at St. Francis Xavier Church and School than Sally Author. She arrived at SFX in 1958, just a year after the church was built. All eight of her children attended the school, followed by nine of her grandchildren ~ and, so far, nine great-grandchildren. Her son, Fr. John Auther, also served as a beloved parish priest at St. Francis for many years.

Sally and her husband, John, played a vital role in the campaign to build the new school. Though Fr. Sullivan often sought to publicly recognize their many contributions, they were far too humble to accept the spotlight.

A devoted daily Mass-goer, Sally once said, "Once I entered SFX Church and could pray to Mary, everything would be better in my life." Even into her late 80s, she made every effort to attend school Masses, delighting in hearing the children read. When asked to support a fundraising effort, she and John responded immediately: "Can it be for the playground?" As the mother of six boys, she knew the value of letting children run and play; for their energy and her sanity.

Sally's love for St. Francis was lifelong, deep, and joyfully lived.



Martin Calfee passed away on July 23, 2024, surrounded by family in his Phoenix home. Though not Catholic, Martin was deeply involved in the St. Francis Xavier community. His wife of 60 years, Monnie, graduated from SFX in 1954, and three of their five daughters and several grandchildren also attended. Martin coached girls' softball, supported school activities, and was a strong advocate for the school's rebuilding campaign.

Born April 2, 1937, in Coral Gables, Florida, Martin was raised in Aurora, Ohio, and proudly served in the U.S. Army. In 1972, he founded Copper State Bolt & Nut Company, which now employs over 600 people. He was also active in local philanthropy, including The Thunderbirds and support for ASU and SFX.

Martin is remembered for his humor, generosity, and commitment to excellence. He is survived by Monnie, his sister Sarah, five daughters, and nine grandchildren. *His legacy at St. Francis and beyond lives on.*

Go Green for God!

In his encyclical letter, Laudato Si' (Care for Our Common Home), Pope Francis challenged us with the responsibility to care for our common home; this beautiful planet we live on that was gifted to us by God for all living creatures. St. Francis Xavier School has made it our mission to do just that with our "Go Green for God" initiative.

There are many ways we can strive for a greener and cleaner way of living without taking drastic measures. The purpose of "Go Green for God" at SFX is to think of new ways to create a smaller carbon footprint each year. Here are some amazing ways our community has worked together so far!

Composting & Gardening

During lunch, students have learned how to sort their trash into recycle, landfill and compost bins. SFX partnered with Recycle City, a sustainable composting business in Phoenix, to make sure all of our food waste goes back into the Earth.

Our school gardens are also flourishing with vegetables that students and staff have worked together to cultivate, grow and harvest. First graders used their classroom compost and worms in their garden to grow food for the Hungry Wolf Cafe. Our middle schoolers also enjoyed the gardens by sampling from their "snack gardens" during the day.

Recycling & Reusing

Our National Junior Honors Society students created a recycling program in each of our classrooms. Every week, NJHS students collected recycled paper from the classroom's "recycled paper only" box to make sure paper stays out of the trash. We're happy to report we have saved over **1,500 POUNDS** of paper from the landfill this year.

Another great way SFX keeps items out of the trash is by bringing reusable water bottles to school. Our water stations make it easy to refill and stay hydrated all day long. The stations even add up the plastic we have saved with each refill, so our students can see how they're making an impact.

We will continue to work hard to think of new, innovative ways to Go Green within our St. Francis community. What is the next step you can take at home in order to care for our common home?
